

Wittgenstein's Later Philosophy: Tools in a Toolbox

Tools in a toolbox

- * The use of a word constitutes its meaning
- * Each word is a tool in our language toolbox
- * Like a hammer, a word "means" whatever it allows us to do with it
- * Philosophy = Describe
 "ordinary language
 practices"

Language games

- * Language use = One great big game of chess
- Range of possible moves determined by rules of the game
- Consistent use + Ability to explain use = Correct Use
- Philosophy = Observe and describe rules

"If someone is using language correctly then, by definition, his words already make sense, they already have meaning. Meaning is therefore not something that awaits approximation via [a] hypothesis, at least for those who can already use a language correctly. Rather, it awaits perspicuous characterization."


