## THE ASSIGNMENT

This project asks you to explore an "unseen" part of our school's campus in order to make this *invisible* space *visible* to other students—and to do this work in an ethical, responsible manner. Over the next three weeks, you will select a campus location, research its most common uses and users, and then create a multimodal presentation that shares the information you have gathered with students and teachers. After presenting, you will submit a two-page critical reflection that connects your group's experience(s) during the project to the work we have been doing with Mieville's *The City & The City*.

## THE CONTENT

In order to create a project that is both **thorough** and **ethical**, your presentation should contain the following five sections:

Rich, detailed description of the "unseen" campus space
Interviews with at least two regular users of this space\*
Interviews with at least two regular non-users of this space\*
Extensive use of images to document the space for audiences
At least three additional sources to support your analysis of the space

You will have <u>8-10 minutes</u> to present your research to the class, so be mindful of your time while planning your presentation. For the reflection, two pages of polished text (about 500-600 words) is expected. We will generate a list of evaluative criteria for both parts of the project as a class.

## THE AUDIENCE

For the presentation, you should imagine an **informed but skeptical** audience of peers and teachers. You should also expect that some in the audience regularly use the space you're researching, so be mindful of assumptions or generalizations when analyzing/sharing what you've found.

\*Anonymity may be requested by interviewees—please speak with me if this occurs.

## THE REALLY IMPORTANT STUFF

<u>Project Length</u>: Presentation = 8-10 minutes Critical Reflection = Two typed pages (500-600 words)

Sources/Evidence: The presentation should feature four total interviews (two users, two non-users) and at least three additional sources that support your analysis of the space. You should also include multiple images, video clips, or other forms of non-textual media. The crtical reflection does not need outside sources, but it should discuss specific moments from your research and presentation experiences.
